With great success were held in Nicosia the final competitions "MATHFactor 2014" for teaching and learning of mathematics through communication activities and "MATHeatre 2014" for teaching and learning of mathematics through mathematical theatre. The two competitions were held on 26 and 27 April 2014 respectively. attracting the interest of many people who attended school students from all over Europe and from third countries to compete while learning! The final stage of competitions was held under the framework of the European Student Conference in **Mathematics** (EUROMATH 2014) under the auspices of the Minister of Education and Culture Dr. Costas Kadis.

The Competitions "MATHFactor 2014" and "MATHeatre 2014" are key instruments of the European project "Le-MATH-Learning mathematics through new communication factors" coordinated by the Cyprus Mathematical Society while the European Office of Cyprus (EOC) participates as a partner.

After one and half years, the European Project Le-MATH, has closely completed the development of a new methodology for the learning and teaching of mathematics to students of age between 9 and 18. This new methodology introduces two new set of tools, which have been specifically created

in order to be used in the training of teachers who teach mathematics to students aged 9-18.

For these two new tools, a new platform has been created, in which one can find a set of good practices that are used globally in the teaching of mathematics through mathematical theatre activities and through mathematics communication activities.

Furthermore, two guidebooks have been drafted that will help teachers to develop the aforementioned tools in their classroom. The final form of the guidelines will be ready for publication by the summer of 2014, in 10 different languages.

The first draft of the guidelines has been already published on the webpage of the <u>www.le-math.eu</u> and they were used during the pilot phase of the project, by teachers and students participating in the finals of MATHFactor Europe 2014 and MATHeatre Europe 2014.

The whole process of the competitions, MATHFactor Europe 2014 and MATHeatre Europe 2014 serves basically as the pilot procedure of the project that examines the effectiveness of this new methodology. During the first phase of the competitions, more than 200 pupil and teachers participated, by submitting their work electronically. After the evaluation of the contestants, 120 pupils and teachers from Cyprus, France, Czech Republic, Lebanon, Greece, Italy, Bulgaria, Romania, Slovenia, Croatia and Serbia have been invited to take part to the competition finals (phase 2).

In MATHFactor Europe 2014, the contestants had three minutes at their disposal to impress the judges and the audience, through a fun and innovative oral presentation that contains mathematical accuracy and at the same time is understandable and enjoyable to a non-mathematical audience. In MATHeatre Europe 2014, the contestants had 5-12 minutes to present a mathematical play.

The participation of schoolchildren "Al-Hadi Institution for deaf, blind and learning disabilities" from Lebanon was quite commendable and moving, and they won the 1st prize in the category MATHeatre aged 14-18 years. The videos of the presentations and the theatrical plays, which made it to the final phase of the competitions, can be found in the "Le-Math" official website.


Mobilizing and Transferring Knowledge on Post-2012 **Climate Policy Implications**

The University of Piraeus participates in the European project "Mobilizing and Transferring Knowledge on Post-2012 Climate Policy Implications" (POLIMP) which is a project funded by the European Union's Seventh Programme for Re-

search, Technological Development and Demonstration. under Grant Agreement No 603847. Main objective of POLIMP is to explore for different policy and • decision making levels, knowledge gaps about implications of possible directions of international climate policies. Subsequently it will cover these gaps with • Trust among policy and decision makers so that knowledge packages derived from stakeholder consultation, analysis of climate policy decision at national, EU and UN policy levels and review of ongoing research.

Within the above framework, POLIMP aims to identify: Where do knowledge gaps exist? What future international climate policies may look like? What these imply for policy and decision makers internationally and within the EU?

Throughout the operation and implementation of POLIMP the following results are expected:



 Creation of a thematic knowledge platform on climate change mitigation, adaptation, technology transfer, finance and market mechanisms.

Optimal performance computing systems in the presence of reliability problems and fluctuations in performance

The University of Cyprus led by Associate Professor of the Department of Computer Sciences Giannakis Sazeides and Assistant Professor in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering Chrysostomos Nikopoulos has received 349.912 EUR funding for the research project called «HARPA» (Harnessing Performance Variability). The project was funded with a total amount of 2.797.000 EUR within the framework of the 7th Framework Programme and has a duration of three years (September 2013 - August 2016). Six young scientists have already been recruited in order to deal with the project's needs.

Over the years, miniaturization of manufacturing technology enables processors to increase the cores in a computer system. Apart from the positive aspects that miniaturization technology offers, there are some effects such as reducing the reliability and deviation from the expected performance of such computational systems. The problems of reliability and performance variations can occur both during construction and during the life of the system. The reduced reliability and the deviations from the expected return can have devas-

tating consequences on critical computer systems. The main objective of the research programme HARPA is addressing the aforementioned effects through mechanisms that can recognize and resolve such problems allowing building future computing systems.

HARPA project is a collaboration between the academic and industrial sectors. Apart from the group of the University of Cyprus, in HARPA participate the University of Milan (POLIMI) who is coordinating the project, the Research Centre IMEC, the Institute of Communications and Computer Systems (ICCS) of the National Technical University of Athens, the Supercomputer Centre IT4I of Technical University of Ostrava, the company THALES as well as the company **HENESIS.**

The career of Marie Skłodowska-Curie fellows



Marie (Skłodowska) Curie fellows enjoy greater success in obtaining grants from the European Research Council (ERC) than their peers, according to a report.

The study from the European Commission finds that researchers who have held a Marie (Skłodowska) Curie fellowship, which funds a period of exchange to a foreign institution, are more likely to be awarded an ERC grant

for research excellence. This also extends to other internationally-recognised awards, with female Marie Curie researchers having a 13 per cent greater probability of obtaining high-profile awards later in their career than non-Marie Curie fellows, reports the study.

Other benefits of the programme include publication success, with Marie Curie fellows recording more articles in higher-profile journals and better citation records.

AAL 2014: Call for developing ICT solutions for sustainable models of care

Ageing demographics and declining health in older adults are predicted to put unaffordable pressures on care systems and society, so change and innovation is required to better cope with these challenges. Old-age support ratios are projected to halve between 2012 and 2050 across OECD countries . There are other factors. such as increased urbanisation and migration that result increasingly in older people living alone and contribute to making current approaches to professional care, informal care and service delivery unsustainable . The 2014 Call Challenge of the Ambient

Assisted Living (AAL) Programme aims at funding the development and testing of ICT-based solutions in real life situations which enable and support sustainable care models for older adults.

Applicants have until **26 June 2014** to submit their proposal that will address the following issues:

- How ICT-based solutions reconcile increased demand with limited resources;
- How ICT-based solutions increase and facilitate the supply of formal and informal care for older adults;

• How ICT-based solutions reduce the demand for care through prevention and self-management;

 How ICT-based solutions can support the shift towards better care at home and in the community

EU Atlas of ICT hotspots

The European Commission • has published the new EU Atlas of ICT hotspots. This atlas shows where digital

technologies thrive and examines the factors contributing to this success.

A region's ICT excellence is linked to research and development activities, to the ability to take knowledge to market (innovation) and to building an intense business activity around this innovation. It seems that ICT thriving regions:

are mostly long standing industrial areas;

- have high-standard educational institutions and other key innovation players;
- have long-term policies on research and innovation;
- have enjoyed historical opportunities (such as being the political national capitals);
- tend to cluster together (half of the 34 Poles of excellence are neighbouring regions).

This effect is also observed in places like the Silicon Valley (USA), Bangalore (India) or Changzhou (China).

Study about the teaching profession

At a time when several countries are faced with shortages of qualified teachers, a new study undertaken on behalf of the European Commission looks at what Member States could do to attract the best people into the profession.

The study looks in detail at what makes the teaching profession attractive (or not), maps the different policy measures

that countries use (or could use) to attract high-quality recruits, to make careers more attractive, and to enhance the social status and prestige of teaching, and assesses their effectiveness. It also makes recommendations for improvements.

The study concerns teachers in primary and secondary education (ISCED 1, 2 and 3) in 32 countries (the 28 EU Member States plus Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Turkey). It is based upon a survey of more than 80,000 student teachers, teachers and school leaders, interviews with national decision-makers, and a review of the research in the field. The key findings are the following:

 In most European countries, the teaching profession has lost much of its attraction for the best candidates because of a decline in prestige, poorer working conditions and relatively low salaries. But Ireland, Finland, Scotland

buck this trend.

- Few countries have specific, long-term strategies to make the profession more attractive to the best candidates, or even to evaluate the effectiveness of their current policies.
- In many countries, the teacher shortage is addressed by longer working hours for teachers. higher pupil-teacher ratios or an increase in the retirement age.

Award ceremony for the winners of the EU Young Translator Contest

On 8 April 2014, the 28 teenage winners of the Commission's annual "Juvenes Translatores" contest for young translators, participated to the ceremony in Brussels, where they received their trophies from Androulla Vassiliou, Commissioner for Education, Culture, Multilingualism and Youth.

More than 3 000 pupils aged 17 participated from schools in each EU coun-

try and this was the first time participation for Croatia. Participants had two hours to translate a one-page text on European citizenship - 2013 being the European Year of Citizens – in any of the 552 language combinations possible from among the EU's 24 official languages. It is worth noting that a total of 157 language combinations were used, the highest to date. The translation tests were marked by Commission translators.

Directive to improve enforcement of workers' rights

Currently 3.3% of the EU labour force, or 8 million people, live and work in another Member State. An additional 1.2 million people live in one EU country but work in another. The EU's Council of Ministers approved on 14 April 2014 the new Directive to ensure the better application at national level of EU citizens' right to work in another Member State. The Member States

now have two years to implement the Directive at national level.

The Directive aims to remove existing obstacles to the free movement of workers, such as the lack of awareness of EU rules among public and private employers and the difficulties faced by mobile citizens to get information and These rules will benefit mobile workers but also employassistance in the host Member States.

To overcome these barriers and prevent discrimination, the Directive will require Member States to ensure:

one or more bodies at national level will provide support and legal assistance to EU migrant workers with the enforcement of their rights

effective legal protection of rights (including for example protection from

victimisation for EU migrant workers who seek to enforce their rights) and

easily accessible information in more than one EU language on the rights enjoyed by EU migrant workers and jobseekers.

More flexible visa rules



Many non-EU nationals wishing to travel to the EU are often faced with cumbersome, lengthy and costly visa procedures. The proposals presented on 1 April 2014 will seriously shorten and simplify the procedures for those wanting to come to the EU for short stays, and induce more cost savings and less bureaucracy, whilst maintaining the level of security. Making the access to the Schengen area easier for legitimate travellers will facilitate doing business. It will boost economic activity and job creation in, for instance, the tourism sector as well as in related activities such as restaurant and transport industries.

Main elements of this package are: (1) Reducing the deadline from 15 to 10 days for processing and taking a decision; (2) Making it possible to lodge visa applications in other EU countries consulates if the Member State competent for processing the visa application is neither present nor represented;(3) Substantial facilitations for regular travellers including mandatory issuing of multiple entry visas valid for three years;(4) Simplified application form and allowing for online applications (5) Possibility for Member States to devise special schemes granting visas at the borders for up to 15 days in one Schengen State; (6) Possibility for Member States to facilitate the issuing of visa for visitors attending major events; (7) A new type of visa (Touring-visa) allowing legitimate travellers to circulate in the Schengen area for up to 1 year (without staying in one Member State for more than 90 days in any 180-day period).

Both proposals must now be approved by the Council of the European Union and the European Parliament, which can be expected at the earliest in 2015. Once the proposals enter into force, the changes will apply to all EU Member States applying the common Schengen visa policy in full as well as the four Schengen associated States (Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Switzerland). It should be noted that Bulgaria, Croatia, Ireland, Cyprus, Romania and the UK do not take part in the visa policy.

New European Platform against undeclared work



The European Commission has proposed on 9 April 2014 the creation of a European Platform to improve cooperation at EU level in order to prevent and deter undeclared work more effectively.

The new Platform would bring together all enforcement bodies involved in tackling undeclared work, such as labour and social security inspectorates and tax and migration authorities, as well as other stakeholders, such as EU-level representatives of employers and employees. The proposal envisages that all Member States should be members of the

Platform, as undeclared work affects all of them, and joint participation of all EU countries is crucial to address crossborder situations.

EU-wide campaign to manage stress at work



Stress is one of the most frequently reported work-related health problem in Europe and is believed to be the cause of the majority of all lost working days. The "Healthy Workplaces Manage Stress" campaign launched on 7 April 2014 by the European Agency for Safety at Health at Work (EU-OSHA) aims to raise awareness about the psychological, physical and social risks linked to stress at work. Addressing stress and psychosocial risks is one of the challenges covered by the forthcoming EU Strategic Framework on Health and Safety at Work 2014-2020, due to be presented in June 2014.

Workers affected by stress find it difficult to concentrate, make more mistakes and are subject to more frequent accidents at work. Prolonged psychological pressure may result in serious health problems such as cardiovascular or musculoskeletal diseases, leading to poor working performance and more absenteeism. The campaign aims to help employers' and workers' representatives, managers and workers to identify and manage stress and psychological, physical and social risks in the workplace. It also promotes the use of simple tools which can help organisations to effectively manage such risks.



Strengthened shareholders' engagement in largest companies

The European Commission has adopted on 9 April 2014 measures to improve the corporate governance of around 10 000 companies listed on Europe's stock exchanges. This would contribute to the competitiveness and long-term sustainability of these companies. Other proposals would also provide costefficient company law solutions for SMEs which operate across borders

The proposal to revise the existing Shareholder Rights Directive would tackle corporate governance shortcomings relating to listed companies and their boards, shareholders, intermediaries and proxy advisors. Key elements of the proposal include stronger transparency requirements for institutional investors and asset man-

SMEs find it hard to obtain feedback on their loan applications

A new evaluation published on 15 April 2014 confirms that the smaller a firm, the larger the likelihood that its credit application might be declined by a financial institution. In particular, smaller companies are struggling to obtain feedback from banks on their declined credit applications even if they have the right to ask for it.

Research results indicate that clear benefits would derive for SMEs from obtaining such feedback: about half of SME respondents to the survey found the feedback received by banks useful as regards obtaining future funding. To tackle the issues reported in the findings, the evaluation recommends the revival of dialogue on trans-

Finalising the Banking Union

On 15 April 2014, the European Parliament has adopted three interconnected key texts to complete the legislative work underpinning the banking union, the Bank Restructuration and Resolution Directive (BRRD), the Single Resolution Mechanism, and the recast Directive on Deposit Guarantee schemes.

The Bank Restructuration and Resolution directive sets new rules for all 28 Member States to put an end to the old paradigm of bank bail-outs, which cost taxpayers' hundreds of billions of euros in the crisis. The Single Resolution Mechanism implements the BRRD in the Eurozone and any other participating Member State. The agreement is based on a strong and efficient Single Resolution Board at its centre,



where the Commission and Council respective role is limited to a minimum. The SRM will allow for the timely and effective resolution of cross border and domestic banks, over a weekend if necessary. Within the Banking Union, the resolution funds will be pooled into one Single Resolution fund. Together with the provisions on preferential treatment for depositors set out in the BRRD rules, the recast Directive on Deposit Guarantee schemes, strengthens even further the protection of depositors: with pre-funded guarantee schemes in each Member State, depositors can rest assured that whatever happens to the bank they deposit money in, their savings up to EUR 100,000 remain fully protected from any loss.

The aim is to improve transparency between banks and SMEs, encourage banks to find ways to improve the feedback they give to SMEs and raise awareness on the relevance of such a feedback on loan applications.

Report on the application of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights



The 4th annual report published on 14 April 2014 by the European Commission on the application of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights, shows that the importance and prominence of the EU Charter continues to rise: the Court of Justice of the EU increasingly applies the Charter in its decisions while national judges are more and more aware of the Charter's impact and seek guidance from the European Court of Justice.

The report also reveals that there is a high interest among citizens in fundamental rights issues: in 2013 the issues most frequently raised by citizens in their correspondence with Europe Direct Contact Centres were free movement and residence (48% of the total number of enquiries), consumer rights issues (12%), judicial cooperation (11%), questions related to citizenship (10%), anti-discrimination and social rights (5%) and data protection (4%).

Consultation on effective child protection systems



The European Commission has kicked off on 10 April 2014 an online public consultation to help Member States develop integrated and effective child protection systems.

The consultation on child protection systems will gather input so that the EU can, by the end of 2014, issue guidance to Member States in this area building on the results achieved in the course of implementation of the EU Agenda for the Rights of the Child. The guidance will take stock of the various existing EU instruments which may affect the protection of the rights of children and suggest how EU countries can better use or implement those

instruments as part of their child protection systems. It will cover all forms of violence as determined by the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. Any individual or organisation with an interest in child protection can participate in the consultation online until 3 July 2014.

Need for more legal clarity in international families' cases

The growing mobility of citizens within the European Union has led to an increasing number of families whose members are of different nationalities, live in different EU countries or live in an EU country of which some of them may not be nationals. When families separate, cross-border judicial co-



operation is necessary to give children a secure legal

environment. A report published by the European Commission on 15 April 2014 highlights legal problems that international couples (spouses from different nationalities) still face across Europe when they try to resolve cross-border disputes concerning their

marriage or the custody of their children. The report underlines that more needs to be done to help international families find legal clarity in such situations (for example on which court is competent).

The European Commission is therefore kicking off a wide public consultation on possible solu-

tions, as well as a campaign to raise awareness of what help and rules exist in case international families decide to separate. Everyone interested can submit contributions to the consultation. The consultation will run until 18 July 2014.
